What is Dyslexia

"Dyslexia is defined as a specific learning disability that is neurobiological in origin. It is characterized by difficulties with accurate and/or fluent word recognition and by poor spelling and decoding abilities"

(International Dyslexia Association)

Simple definition


Dyslexia is a neurological condition which makes it difficult to read, write, and spell in your native language despite having at least average intelligence.

Many schools use the classification Specific Learning Disability (SLD) instead of Dyslexia.

NJ Law

New Jersey law now requires school districts to provide certain teaching staff members at least two hours of professional development instruction on the screening, intervention, accommodation, and use of technology for students with reading disabilities, including dyslexia (C.18A:6-131).

NIH Findings released 1994



1 in 5 students have Dyslexia Most go undiagnosed.

NIH Findings

- > Dyslexia is due to a difficulty processing language. It is not due to visual problem.
- > Dyslexics use a different part of their brain when reading.
- > Dyslexic children display difficulty with the sound/symbol correspondences of our written code
- Reading failure is highly preventable through direct, explicit instruction in phonemic awareness.
- Children do not outgrow reading failure or dyslexia.

Dyslexics are not:

- lazy
- unmotivated
- stupid
- uneducated

The right side of their brain is more developed so their visual-spatial skills and their logic and reasoning skills are far superior

Provides a fun way to help overcome common letter reversals. Tilt It activity uses kinesthetic learning techniques to help kids map their left side/right side to correct letter formation. They will learn the correct position of letter loops by being challenged to tilt the device in the correct direction to form letters. The second activity, Flip It, allows them to practice what they learned while honing their letter discrimination skills.



Key Points

- Dyslexia is a lifelong condition that affects reading, writing, spelling and even speaking.
- Dyslexia is very common and is not a sign of low intelligence.
- Teaching methods that involve sight, sound and touch can improve skills significantly.
- Proper interventions can have life changing effects
